
Place, 020 7715 5818) but also an excellent place to eat, serving a menu focused on beef, lamb, game and seafood, mainly sourced from Scotland. You can dine to the sound of live jazz, blues and soul, and there is a more informal bar and grill on the first floor.

At Ibérica Canary Wharf (Cabot Square, 020 7636 8650) executive chef Nacho Manzano,



chef-patron of the two Michelinstarred Casa Marcial in Asturias, and his protégé Cesar Garcia have designed an innovative Spanish tapas menu.

For breathtaking views, book a seat at **Plateau** (020 7715 7100), located on the fourth floor of Canada Place. Here you can enjoy classic French dishes at the restaurant, or dine at the more informal bar and grill.

The latest addition is the Parisian restaurant Le Relais de Venise L'Entrecôte (Mackenzie Walk, 020 3475 3331). It takes no reservations and has no menu-it's green salad, steak and frites for all, ensuring you can eat well but still be in and out within your lunch hour. It's open every evening too. Or, if you are out to impress, try the fresh northern Japanese Robata grill at Roka (The Park Pavilion, 020 7636 5228). The menu also features dishes from the main kitchen and a selection of sushi and sashimi.

Family-friendly dining

There are a number of quality, family-friendly dining options, such as the hamburger joint **Byron** (Cabot Place, 020 7715 9360)

and Mexican diner Wahaca (The Park Pavilion, 020 7516 9145).

Adults and children alike enjoy good pizzas and pasta, so
Wildwood (Jubilee Place, 020
7719 1213) and Pizza Express
(Cabot Place, 020 7513 0513)
are always reliable choices, as is
Carluccio's (Reuters Plaza, 020
7719 1749). For a big family treat, there's Jamie's Italian (Churchill Place, 020 3002 5252), which was the first Jamie's Italian to be opened in London.

Food on the go

There is no shortage of cafés.
Highlights include Café Brera at
Cabot Place and Jubilee Place and
Taylor St Barista on the South
Colonnade in addition to Costa,
Caffè Nero and Starbucks. For
a healthier option there's Crussh,
or try an all-natural pie at Square
Pie, both at One Canada Square.

Sweet treats

Got a sweet tooth? Head to Sweet Couture Cake Boutique (Canada Place, 020 7519 1042) or Krispy Kreme (Canada Place, 020 7513 1000). Hotel Chocolat (Canada Place, 020 7519 6190) and Charbonnel et Walker (Cabot Place, 020 7512 9168), also offer delectable confectionery.

For those who know that good ice cream is a fine art, **Zazà** offers more than 70 gelato flavours, all made from natural ingredients. They also offer healthy lunchtime delights at their branches in Canada Place and Jubilee Place (020 7719 1442).

Heron Quays Park

Recently opened Heron Quays Park is a pocket of lawns, trees and plants situated alongside Middle Dock. Typical of the eye for art that is evident across the Canary Wharf estate, it features sculptures including two works by Charles Hadcock—Torsion II and Helisphere—which started their life at Canary Wharf as part of the artist's major exhibition in Jubilee Park in 2011. These two works have now joined the outstanding collection of outdoor sculptures and other works of art waiting to be discovered around the estate.

Art outside

The light levels of traffic in Canary Wharf make it easy for you to take a stroll around its squares and plazas. Westferry Circus is surrounded by railings and gates by Guiseppe Lund, while the larger size of Canada Square Park allows it to host all kinds of sports and cultural events throughout the year (for diary highlights see pages 26-30). Jubilee Park is a leafy space above the ticket hall of Canary Wharf tube station, with a walled water feature. There are also regular temporary art exhibitions there.

Go for a wander and discover other outdoor artworks, like Jeff Bell's sculptural cast glass disguising the ventilation shafts at Cabot Square, Igor

Mitoraj's centaur sculpture on Montgomery
Square and the translucent blue 'Columbus
Screen' by Wendy Ramshaw, near the pool
and fountains of Columbus Courtyard.

The latest art commission revealed at Canary Wharf is a massive painting on the 150m-long bridge spanning the dock between Canary Wharf and Heron Quays DLR stations. Artist Sinta Tantra was



inspired by the surrounding architecture and the changing light and weather, as well as by her Balinese heritage. She joins the many other international artists with works here, including Bill Culbert, chosen to represent New Zealand in the 2013 Venice Biennale, whose neon sculpture 'Coup de Foudre II' adorns **Churchill Place**.
